Engaging "New Seniors" and Older Adults in the Life of the Church

Developing ministry opportunities for aging adults and "new seniors" is no longer optional! It is an absolute necessity! **WHY? The future is aging.** These are days of tremendous opportunity in the community of faith. Up to this point, churches have had limited, if any older adult ministry.

The times are changing! The median age of Presbyterians was 58 in 2001. Today the median age is 61. For every worshiper between the ages of 15 and 25 there are more than six worshipers over the age of 65.

Be assured older adults and the so-called "new seniors" of today are anything but rocking chair bound. All across the nation you will hear the demand for "productive," "creative," "vital," and "successful" aging. Churches that catch a vision for ministry by, with, and for older adults and "new seniors" will find renewal springing up in the church and subsequent numerical and spiritual growth.

America is aging! The population shift is astounding as we move from a predominately young to an aging culture. During the 20th century, the number of Americans aged 65 and older increased eleven-fold, from 3 million to 33 million. According to U.S. Census Bureau projections, those numbers will more than double in the next four decades to well over 70 million! An Older Adult or "New Seniors" ministry offers tremendous opportunities that allow individuals to serve in ways that are unique, meaningful, and life changing. The church should be one of the best sources for volunteers to serve in our communities. It is the first time in history where it will be common to have five or six generations occupying the same pew.

My fascination with changing demographics has always been an interest from my former retail career, and transformed to a sense of call following my graduation from Columbia Seminary. I began to see the vision for older adult ministry from several PC(USA) resources and their expertise. This vision is not my own, but shared by many of you as the changing demographics become reality. I am grateful to be the conduit for older adult ministry, and I am grateful for those who support and encourage a ministry, which will enable older adults to achieve the highest possible level of the abundant life Jesus came to offer. My hope and prayer is that Eastminster will fully embrace older adult ministry as one of her own. My faith and call is to be of help to all people, ministering to older adults and others wherever they be, helping them to rediscover the joy of being members of the body of Christ.

Music at Castminster

Psalms, Hymns, and Spiritual Songs April 22nd ~ 6:00 pm

The Spring concert by the Chancel Choir will be a program of choral selections taking the words of Paul's letter to the Colossians to heart. Please mark your calendar now to attend a program which will contain music to delight the ear and inspire the soul. Invite a friend, bring a neighbor to a very special evening of music.

WELL, NOW THAT YOU MENTIONED SPIRITUAL SONGS....

Ephesians 5:19 - "speaking to one another in *psalms* and *hymns* and *spiritual songs*, singing and making melody with your heart to the Lord;"

Definitions and examples of the first two categories, as done in the two preceding articles, demonstrate they can be considered different entities if one considers the Psalter as the sole source of the one as distinguished from hymns, songs written under the influence of Scripture but not direct quotation. The third category of those expressions of praise and worship of God is the most difficult to define. Indeed, *spiritual songs* takes on different meanings throughout history and within various cultures.

A beginning example from the Old Testament is from the book of Isaiah - not just Isaiah the prophet, but also Isaiah the poet. Most familiar to us is Isaiah 12 - referred to as The First Song of Isaiah (and we sing it in paraphrase "Surely It Is God Who Saves Me"). There is also Isaiah 42:1-4; 49:1-6; 50:4-9 and 52:13-53:12 - referred to as the "servant songs".

Moving ahead 2000 years, Isaac Watts published *Hymns and Spiritual Songs* in London in 1707. In his preface, to differentiate spiritual songs from hymns, he writes "I have borrowed the Sense, and much of the Form of the Song from some particular Portions of Scripture,... In these I expect to be often censured for a too religious Observance of the Words of Scripture." For the full text, access on-line: www.ccel.org/cceh//archives/eee/wattsprh.htm.

Moving to North America, the term *spiritual song* continued in similar use - but not the term *spiritual.* Negro Spiritual first appears in print in the 1860s where slaves are described as using the noun *spiritual* for religious songs. Although numerous rhythmical and sonic elements of these spirituals can be traced to African sources, nonetheless it is a fact that Negro spirituals are a musical form that is indigenous and specific to the religious experience in the United States of Africans transported from Africa. They are a result of the interaction of African religious elements with music and religion derived from Europe. Further, this interaction occurred only in the United States. Africans who converted to Christianity in other parts of the world did not evolve this form.

Today, the term *spiritual song* has been appropriated to mean any of a number of modern musical forms and the term *spiritual* to include songs written in the style of the Negro spiritual.

No matter how defined or differentiated each is from the other, the call to us by the Apostle Paul in Colossians 3:16 is clear:"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly as you teach and admonish one another with all wisdom, and as you sing *psalms*, *hymns and spiritual songs* with gratitude in your hearts to God.".
