Tidal People

It is 4:30 p.m. The tide is out, and the air is dead still. No Spanish moss is moving, no birds are seen flying, and even the oyster beds are quiet. The heat is oppressive, and we've entered the "dog days", the hottest time of the year in Crescent, Ga. So, why come at this time of year? It's all about the moon, the tides, and the fishing: trout, redfish, blue crabs, and of course the famous Georgia shrimp, the sweetest and best in the world.

In this day and time, we can control so many things in our lives. We are able to communicate with anyone, anywhere, at any time of the day or night. We can set up a huge conference with people from all over the world without ever leaving our homes. We have landlines, cell phones, laptops, IPhones, IPods, Tablets, and Androids. We can launch rockets with the push of a button and know that the target will be dead on, with immediate visual results. We are able to make our computers recognize our voices or even identify us by the iris of our eyes. Seemingly, there is little beyond our ability to manipulate, at least to some degree; but alas, we cannot control the tides.

This tiny, hidden piece of coastal heaven is ruled by the tides. Many people work two jobs, and chances are that at least one of them involves the river. Some drive gas trucks and fish for crab. Some own barbershops and run shrimp boats. Others clean houses and provide oysters or fish to local restaurants. The main job is not the one on land, but the one on the river. Working hours all depend on the tides, something man will never conquer.

Here it is not just the honest, hardworking individuals whose work is tide driven. Even the thieves depend on the tides. Their boats steal through the night to docks of isolated homes that sit so far off the road one would not know they existed. An unoccupied house on the river is all too frequently a target of thieves. Homes are burglarized, and appliances, furniture, air conditioners, even pictures on the walls are stolen. Some do not stop at burglary. The poor county of McIntosh hosts many a drug deal as desperate people try to make a living "the easy way". Deals gone bad sometimes end in death, with a list of missing persons never to be seen again. The marsh makes quick work of a body, with river creatures quickly erasing all evidence of a human life. It is rare that that the one responsible for such sadness is ever brought to justice. Fortunately, these beings are the exception rather than the rule.

Within a few square miles there are at least four Baptist churches, all full on Sunday mornings. Salty, crusty, and weathered, the river people seem to have much more reverence and respect for God than do some city folk. They are reverent, prayerful, loyal Christians who worship on Sunday, eat dinner at noon knowing that their next meal may be provided only by the grace of God. They are quick to tell you that you will be lifted in prayer in times of difficulty. They rest on Sunday afternoons, do not hurry, for there's no reason to, and they work late and rise early. They visit the sick, and take meals to those grieving. River people help their neighbors, sharing whatever they have and are fiercely devoted to family and God. Their faith is as strong as the muscled arms that pull the traps and haul the nets. It is not questioned, for these people are raised from infancy with faith in their Lord.

In April, the Blessing of the Fleet begins the shrimping season. It is a time of celebration and hope for a season of prosperity. Those who make their living shrimping take the Blessing very seriously, and they are sent on their way with prayers and well wishes from the whole town. The town of Darien takes on an almost carnival like atmosphere, with locals singing and hawking their wares as they send their loved ones on their way. Each time a shrimp boat goes out, it is in God's hands more than that of man, and there is always a possibility that it may not return. The hours are long, the work is hard, and it is not for the lazy or faint of heart.

In this small town, strangers are quickly identified, though not just by their license plates. Many years ago, I was in the one, small grocery store and a young special needs boy was bagging my groceries. He talked to all of the locals, cheerfully greeting them by first names when he suddenly spied me. With a great big smile that revealed few teeth, he said to the cashier "Looky here! She has bluebirds in her eyes, pearls on her teeth and diamonds in her ears, she ain't from around here!" As I left the store laughing, I tried to imagine living this slow, southern life that is ruled by the tides. I thought of our hurried city lives, which often result in missing so many enjoyments of life. When we first arrive here in Crescent, we hurry to unpack, hurry to the grocery store, hurry to get the boat in the water, hurry to get going with our vacation. It takes a few days to slow down and accustom ones' self to this way of living. After finally settling in, we begin to adapt to the lifestyle. It is then that we realize we need no clock to tell us when to do anything; we need only watch the tides.
